The past month we had a 300% increase in aggravated assaults 4 vs 1 with one being cleared by arrest. Residential burglaries were up 18% as well as Strong Armed robbery 100%. I am happy to report that our Auto thefts, Commercial Burglaries and Larceny from Auto's have decreased.

Back to School Checklist

The first day of school can bring jitters to students and families alike. There are many things that can be done to help make the back to school transition easier. When you, as a parent, interact with and support your children, your children are more likely to be successful.

You can help younger children if they know:

- Their name, address and phone number.
- How to take outer clothing on and off.
- How to take care of their basic toilet needs.
- How to be patient and wait their turn.

Before their first day:

- Establish a bed time routine that ensures adequate rest.
- Have children spend time one on one or in small groups with other children their age.
- Help your child learn letters, numbers, colors and shapes.
- Read to your children daily.
- Let your children learn by trying new activities.
- Practice the route they will take to and from school.
- Talk about making friends and doing new activities.
- Visit your child's school and classroom if possible.

For older students, let them know you are interested:

- Talk to your children about friends, classes and activities.
- Teach your children to set goals.
- Encourage your children to be involved in extracurricular activities at school, church and in the community.
- Give your children opportunities to try new skills and earn recognition for a job well done.
- Help your children learn how to manage their time.

As a parent, it is recommended that you:

- Establish definite times and location for homework.
- Attend parent teacher conferences.
- Join the school's Parent Teacher Organization (PTO).
- Keep the school calendar handy.
- Volunteer at your children's school.
- Stay informed about school events.
- Get to know your children's friends.
- Teach your children how to say "no" to peer pressure.
- Make sure all social functions have adult supervision.
- Place restrictions on your children's work schedules.

WITH SCHOOL STARTING HERE ARE SOME THINGS YOU NEED TO KNOW

PASSING A STOPPED SCHOOL BUS:

by failing to stop for a stopped school bus which was displaying its (mechanical stop signal) (flashing red lights) and was stopped for the purpose of receiving or discharging passengers. GS 20-217(a). No PJC. [NOTE: If serious bodily injury results, the offense is a FELONY].

SPEEDING IN A SCHOOL ZONE:

by exceeding the posted speed limit at a speed of _____ MPH in a 25 MPH posted school zone during posted hours on a day when school was in session. GS 20-141.1.

CHILD RESTRAINT:

by transporting a child of less than 16 years of age without having the child properly secured in a seat belt OR by transporting a child less than 8 years of age AND less than 80 pounds in weight without having the child properly secured in a child passenger restraint system. GS 20-137.1.

SCHOOL CROSSING GUARD OR PATROL:

by (failing to stop) (failing to remain stopped) in obedience to a (hand signal) (flag) (stop sign) (audible signal) given by a (school crossing guard) (school patrol). Sec. 14-127.



Youth Protection Ordinance

Purpose: The purpose of this ordinance is to protect juveniles from victimization and exposure to criminal activity by establishing a curfew for juveniles under the age of 16 years in the City of Charlotte and unincorporated Mecklenburg County. This is intended to reinforce and promote the role of the parent in raising and guiding children and promote the health, safety, and welfare of both juveniles and adults by creating an environment offering better protection and security for all concerned.

History: In 1995 the City of Charlotte created a Youth Protection Ordinance that established a curfew for children less than 16 years of age. In 1996 the Mecklenburg County Commission passed a Youth Protection Ordinance essentially identical to the City of Charlotte's Youth Protection Ordinance. The key provision of the ordinance is the establishment of a curfew for children under 16 years of age. This ordinance governs offenses in both the City and the County.

Definitions: -- **Juvenile** means any person under the age of 16 years. -- **Public place** means any place that is generally open to and used by the public, including, but not limited to, streets, sidewalks, highways, alleys, public vehicular areas and parking lots, transportation facilities, theaters, restaurants, schools and school grounds, playgrounds, parks, and other common areas open to or accessible to the public.

Restricted Hours: (1) Sunday, Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, or Thursday – 11:00 p.m. until 6:00 a.m. (2) Friday or Saturday, 12:01 a.m. until 6:00 a.m.

Offenses: (1) A juvenile commits an offense by being present in or remaining in any public place or on the premises of any establishment within the city during the restricted hours. (2) A parent or guardian of a juvenile commits an offense if he/she knowingly permits or allows the juvenile to remain in any public place during the restricted hours. (3) The owner, operator, or an employee of an establishment commits an offense if he/she knowingly allows a juvenile to remain upon the premises of the establishment during the restricted hours. (4) It is a violation of the ordinance for any person 16 years of age or older to aid or abet a juvenile in being present or remaining in a public place within the city during the restricted hours. (5) It is a violation of the ordinance for a parent or guardian to refuse to take custody during the restricted hours. (Certain exceptions exist for juveniles in a public place during the restricted hours which are set out in the ordinance.)

Penalties: (1) A juvenile who violates any provision of the ordinance is subject to being adjudicated delinquent. (2) Any parent/guardian or other person who violates the ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.



Firearm By Felon



The Charlotte-Mecklenburg Police Department has launched a program intended to target felons carrying firearms in our community. The program will urge members of the community to call a dedicated phone line and forward anonymous information with the identity and whereabouts of a felon in the possession of a firearm. The anonymous caller will be eligible for a \$500.00 reward if an arrest is made as a result of their anonymous tip. Additionally, anyone in the public who forwards information leading to the arrest of a person illegally carrying a firearm may be eligible for a cash reward.

During this campaign the community is asked to call our firearm tip line at 704.336.6000 to speak with a dispatcher. They will need to give the name and or detailed description of the suspect, and where the person is at the time of the call.

When the citizen calls to report a felon is in possession of a firearm, the following information should be obtained:

- **Location**

Where is the felon located at this time? Where do the police need to respond to locate the felon?

- **Event Type and Subtype**

The event type for the call is WP FWF- Weapon Felon with Firearm. The subtype should be Just Occurred. This combination will enter the call as a priority 2 event.

- **Felon's name**

What is the felon's name and how does the caller know they are a felon?

- **Description**

Ask the caller for a complete description of the felon including clothing.

Direction of Travel

If the felon is on foot, what direction are they walking toward or from?

Special Note - If the felon is in a moving car, enter a BOLO message with description of both the felon and vehicle including the direction of travel. Do not enter a call for service. Advise the caller that a broadcast has been entered but because the felon is in a moving vehicle a call for service will not be entered.

• **Weapon Information**

What type weapon and a description of the weapon? What is the location of the weapon? If the felon is carrying the weapon, does the caller know where, on the person, the weapon is?

• **Contact Information**

If the caller will leave call back information, enter the information into the call. If the caller refuses to give call back information, DO NOT enter any call back information in the call. ANI information should not be entered if the caller refused.

Case Numbers

The caller will receive a monetary reward for their call if the felon was actually located and arrested with the weapon. To determine the outcome of their call and collect the reward, the caller will need to contact Crime Prevention. They can contact Crime Prevention after the next two business days. To track the call that was entered for this caller, a specific set of numbers called Case Numbers must be assigned to the event and given to the caller.

Dispatching the Event

The call will enter the queue as a priority 2 and should be dispatched accordingly. Priority 2 events are dispatched as priority 1 events by dispatchers and responded to as priority 3 events by officers. DO NOT give caller information to the officer if the caller did not agree to provide the information. **Callers will not be required to leave their name, number, or address.** Detective Marty Cuthbertson with the Charlotte-Mecklenburg Crime Stoppers will follow up on the dispositions of these anonymous calls and will arrange a time and date to pay out reward money to the caller when applicable. As always, anyone requiring an emergency response from police is asked to immediately call 9-11.
